General Manager's Report

General Manager

2018 was a landmark year for Propel and was a huge year for me both personally and professionally.

In July, my incredible wife Jennifer endured a 21-hour labour to give birth to our baby daughter Ember. And in December, I was thrilled to be offered my dream job as General Manager at Propel. I love working here with such a small but dedicated team, and I especially love talking to young artists and arts-workers about what they're doing, where they're going, and how we might be able to help. I believe that creative young people are the lifeblood of our community.

I want my own children – Ezra and Ember – to grow up in a society where art is considered a natural resource even more valuable than iron ore and gas because, to me, the arts is serious business and not an expendable luxury. I have seen the critical role that the arts play in stimulating creativity and in developing vital communities. Our lives are enriched every day by what artists do. We need artists. Our societies need artists. And artists need support, nurture and encouragement, especially as young people.

At Propel, we do some heavy lifting in terms of providing access for young people across the art forms and helping to elevate the careers of emerging artists and arts-workers in WA.

In 2018, Propel reached around 65,000 young people through our services, projects, and related initiatives. This included almost 25,000 direct participants via ongoing programs such as the Youth Week WA KickstART Festival, Drug Aware YCulture Metro, Mosaic, Sketchbook Project, and new projects like the City of Perth Busking Program.

I was also invited to represent Propel in Geraldton and Esperance, to present Youth Engagement workshops as part of the Regional Arts Partnership Program (RAPP), which is supported by Country Arts WA. Within the RAPP, Propel is part of 'The Creative Grid', an unprecedented collaboration of more than thirty regional arts organisations working in partnership with eight metro-based peak arts organisations.

We take the advice and opinions of our young members and stakeholders seriously, which is why we conducted a comprehensive consultation process this year, inviting input from: our 500+ members, 2,000+ email subscribers, 10,000+ social media followers, and over 300 industry stakeholders. Through a series of feedback sessions, online surveys and in-person meetings, we were able to gain insight on what we do well and where we need to improve.

Three key findings from this consultation process were that:

- There is still a need for a dedicated creative youth space within the Perth CBD
- More programming and opportunities should developed for the 12-16 age group
- Further resources are required for Propel to better serve young people living in satellite suburbs, regional centres, and in under-represented communities.

This is more than research to aide in our ongoing strategic planning processes. This is a call to action from our constituents and I see it as Propel's duty over the next few years to do everything we can to achieve these goals while sustaining our current services and programs.

We hear you, we thank you, and we can't wait to build upon this foundation with you.



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Youth Week WA KickstART Festival

The KickstART Festival is the flagship metropolitan event for Youth Week WA. KickstART offers young people in WA free opportunities to be creative, develop their skills, showcase their work to the community, and to find out about the arts organisations, cultural institutions and service providers available to them.

Each year, Propel forms a Youth Week WA Planning Committee of up to 30 young people, to assist in the planning of KickstART and to decide upon a theme for Youth Week WA across the State. The Committee has a key role in devising, planning, and contributing to the implementation of all activities, workshops, talks, performances, exhibitions and special events held throughout KickstART.

This approach ensures genuine engagement, valuing young people's contribution to our community, and a distinct focus on their needs, concerns, and interests throughout the program.

The key components of the KickstART program in 2018 included workshops, special events, mentorships, performances, exhibitions, talks, and major events such as the KickstART Festival Day and Festival Closing.

Specific programming content is decided upon by Propel in consultation with the Creative Coordinator – who was Zal Kanga-Parabia in 2018 – and the Youth Week WA Planning Committee.


In 2018, over 15,000 people participated in the Youth Week WA KickstART Festival, including:

- 7 2 Youth Week WA Ambassadors
- 3 KickstART artist ambassadors
- **7** 65 volunteers
- 25 Youth Week WA Planning Committee members
- 5 project interns
- 7 107 emerging artists and workshop facilitators
- 1,135 young participants as workshops, talks, performances and special events
- 14,000+ attendees on Festival Day and Festival Closing combined.

Propel uses the KickstART Festival as a platform to build partnerships with funding agencies (including the Department of Communities, City of Perth); key cultural institutions (including Art Gallery of WA, State Library of WA, State Theatre Centre of WA); arts organisations (including Barefaced Stories, The Gelo Company, Paper Mountain); and organisations outside of the arts (including Scitech, YACWA, Edmund Rice Centre WA).



YOUTH WEEK WA KICKSTART FESTIVAL



KICKSTART FESTIVAL DAY

On Saturday 14 April, KickstART Festival Day opened Youth Week WA in Perth by featuring: 10 hours of live music from local artists; over 50 market stalls with young people selling their creative wares; free activities, interactive installations, and drop-in workshops throughout the day.

The event activated the Perth Cultural Centre and was entirely free to attend and open to the general public with a specific target on young people. Festival Day also featured outreach from:

- YMCA HQ, who ran a program of street dance, hip hop, drumming and DJ sets
- Edmund Rice Centre WA, who ran drop-in basketball sessions outside the State Library
- WA Museum, who canvassed young people for opinions and ideas for the New Museum
- Perth Observatory, who offered free guided telescope viewings during the evening
- Scitech, who ran interactive science demonstrations throughout the day.

KICKSTART WORKSHOPS

Propel hosted 30 facilitated skill-building sessions facilitated by emerging and established local artists, along with community organisations and leaders. KickstART Workshop highlights during the 2018 Festival included:

ACCESS ALL AREAS @ THE STATE THEATRE CENTRE OF WA

32 young participants learned about the technical processes that come together onstage to create a professional theatre production, from the expert crew at the State Theatre Centre of WA. This full-day technical theatre workshop introduced participants to stage lighting, audio, AV techniques, and the mechanics involved in rigging and fly work.

STARTING OFF RIGHT: MUSIC BUSINESS WORKSHOP

23 participants gained knowledge on how to source more live gigs and set-up their finances as musicians and / or aspiring music businesses. This workshop was facilitated by industry experts Em Burrows (RTRFM / WAM) and Kylie Thompson (Sorrento Strategic Music).

SEWABLE ELECTRONICS

In two weekend sessions, 22 participants learned about future fashion possibilities and how they could make their own sewn circuit using metallic thread to light up their own felt design with LEDs to take home, in this workshop initiative held in partnership with the Scitech CSIRO Lab.

INTRODUCTION TO PLAYBACK THEATRE

In two weekday afternoon sessions aimed at different age groups (12-15 and 16-26 respectively), 37 young people participated in a physical workshop, where they learned skills to value-add to any theatre or film acting they may pursue, especially audition technique and monologues. This workshop was facilitated by Nichola Renton of Playback Theatre.

MONSTERS. AS. FRIENDS WITH STEVE BROWNE

10 young participants joined Perth-based mural artist Steve Browne for a visual arts workshop where they challenged themselves while trying their hand at white painting characters onto black boards. This workshop was held in partnership with PICA.

DJOONDAL DJOOMBA WITH DR NOEL NANNUP

24 participants joined Dr Noel Nannup, (Male Elder of the Year 2017 NAIDOC Perth) as he shared the Noongar Dreamtime story, 'The Carers of Everything' across three nights, with each evening building upon the previous one, at Supreme Court Gardens.



PERFORMANCES

11 live professional performance opportunities for young and emerging artists and arts groups were presented during the KickstART Festival, highlighting music, theatre and site specific works. KickstART Performance highlights during the 2018 Festival included:

WA YOUTH SLAM FINAL

WA Youth Slam is the state's first ever poetry slam just for young people. Poets aged 18 and under compete to win one-to-one poetry mentoring, a cash prize and the title of WA Youth Slam Champion. The rules are simple: poets have two minutes to perform an original poem that makes their audience feel things. 236 people attended this event in the Courtyard at the State Theatre Centre.

THE COCKBURN INCIDENT

At the beginning of their final year of high school, Cockburn College's oval is desecrated. The School Captain, Diane, and her BFF, Lucy, go all 'Murder, She Wrote' on the situation to uncover the culprit. A celebration of friendship and memes, The Cockburn Incident explores our responsibility in this weird, unpredictable world. 144 people attended this performance season across three nights at the Centre for Stories in Northbridge.

COLAB

The youth edition of WAs longest running regular monthly hip hop freestyle night was held at The Moon Cafe and featured the city's finest young lyricists backed by a band comprised of a wide range of Perth's musical talent. 83 people attended this event.

FESTIVAL CLOSING

Held on the final weekend of KickstART in the Studio Underground at the State Theatre Centre, Festival Closing was a concert focussed on Perth's local emerging electronic music producers, performers and experimental artists. This year's line-up included: Feels, Yung Squid, Hi.Ok. Sorry., Bella Ndayikeze, Breaking Waves and WYN.

EXHIBITIONS

3 exhibition opportunities – one encouraging broad participation from across WA and the remaining two supporting young artists via mentorships with local curators and institutions – were held as part of KickstART this year.

SKETCHBOOK PROJECT

For eight consecutive years, Propel has sent out blank sketchbooks to hundreds of participants across WA, ready to be cut, painted and inked, filled with designs, stories or drawings from young people across our vast State. Every sketchbook submitted was displayed in the main foyer of the State Library of WA during the Youth Week WA KickstART Festival, before embarking on a state-wide tour of regional and suburban libraries for the rest of the year.

KICKSTARTISTS

An ongoing project for young WA-based artists to exhibit and sell their works commission-free. Each year, KickstARTISTS includes an artist development program where a young artist is mentored by an established curator. In 2018, Ella Wylynko – co-author of GOSHI Magazine – was mentored by Claire Bushby, Curator of Spectrum Project Space at Edith Cowan University.

THE CORSINI COLLECTION: REVISITED

Local emerging artists were selected to participate in the Propel x AGWA Mentorship Program, to create one new work and select one of their existing works, in response to the historical works that resonated with them in the A Window on Italy: The Corsini Collection exhibition at the Art Gallery of WA. Participating artists were Danna Torres Bennz, Melissa Clements, Saleheh Gholami, Jarrad Levy, Pip Lewi, and Lauren Rodriguez. The exhibition was curated by Aisyah Sumito in mentorship with Dunja Rmandić.

TALKS

8 presentations were held in 2018, with most delivered by inspirational young leaders based on topics relevant to the arts and broader social issues affecting young people, with topics advised upon by the Youth Week WA Planning Committee. KickstART Talks highlights during the 2018 Festival included:

Y TALKS

A youth-driven platform for social exchange, knowledge exchange, and inclusiveness within the WA community. Four inspirational young guest speakers shed light on and discuss their groundbreaking ideas, personal narratives, and change-making projects. 53 people attended Y Talks at the State Library of WA.

EVERYDAY PHYSICS – ILLUMINATING NATURE

This science communication presentation occurred across two afternoons in the State Library of WA and was facilitated by Petr Lebedev, researcher on Dr Karl's Outrageous Acts of Science, who has appeared on ABC Radio National and on numerous podcasts. A total of 76 people attended these events.

INDUSTRY TALKS

An eclectic mix of professional WA creatives from across the arts sector, had an informal Q&A session about what it's like working in the creative industry, providing stories and advice on how young people can develop their own careers. 33 people attended this event.





MENTORSHIPS

3+ artform-specific programs were held prior to this year's KickstART Festival, where young people learned directly from industry professionals over a prolonged period, with public outcomes during Youth Week WA.

HIDDEN MOVEMENTS

A creative development program, where 5 young dancers from all disciplines worked under the guidance of dance artist Bernadette Lewis, to develop their skills in choreography, improvisation, and take their individual artistic practices to the stage in a series of performances at the State Theatre Centre. Due to popular demand, this program will return as part of KickstART in 2019, and will also extend to include a Mandurah program.

HEART OF GLASS NEON DESIGN

2 emerging Design and Arts students worked with local artisans – Benjamin Kontoullas and George Aitken – through the delicate and arduous process of creating neon lettering which were publicly displayed in the Perth Cultural Centre during this year's Festival, and will be displayed in future years of KickstART.

KICKSTART X AGWA MENTORSHIP & EXHIBITION

A cohort of 6 emerging artists and 1 young curator were selected for this inaugural professional development program, where they created a new exhibition responding to identified themes from A Window On Italy: The Corsini Collection - Masterpieces from Florence.










Mosaic a public photography project, workshop series and exhibition, which chronicles a day in WA from the perspectives of hundreds of participants from all walks of life within our State. The project has been running as an annual event since 2012.

In 2018, Mosaic Capture Day was held on Saturday 22 September, after an extensive 8-week marketing campaign. There were 306 submissions this year and, for the first time ever, all nine regional areas of WA were represented. Our youngest featured photographer was 4 and our oldest was 70. Being an all ages project, Mosaic is an important opportunity for Propel to engage with the wider WA community.

Working with local emerging artists, Propel delivered a suite of subsidised photography workshops and activities, providing further pathways for inclusivity and involvement from the public, while raising further awareness of the project.

Tasha Faye led a portraiture photography walk throughout Northbridge; well-known blogger and photographer Nirrimi Firebrace led a workshop and talk about her experience with photography and how to live a creative lifestyle; and Zal Kanga-Parabia facilitated an astrophotography workshop which allowed participants to connect to a telescope in space and capture images of stars and space.

We also held a young creatives picnic meet-up, where special guest photographers came and facilitated activities for attendees to collaborate with each other. Propel partnered with Community Development at the

City of Kwinana, to further subsidise participation in all Mosaic workshops and activities for participants in the LyriK program.

Internationally renowned photographer and Propel alumnus Jarrad Seng presented a talk with his friend (and equally renowned photographer) Benjamin Hardman to a crowd of over 150 young people at the State library of WA. The talk was entertaining and insightful and the responses were overwhelmingly positive. We were delighted to have Jarrad, who created the Mosaic concept, involved with Propel once again.

The Mosaic Exhibition was held at City Arts Space, in the Northbridge Piazza, from Monday 15 October until Sunday 11 November. The opening night was a big hit with 317 people in attendance, and a further 683 visits recorded by staff and volunteers during the course of the exhibition.

Photos from this year's Mosaic exhibition showed the electric atmosphere at Optus Stadium for the West Coast Eagles' preliminary final dismantling of Melbourne and punters enjoying the opening day of the Perth Royal Show. 10 beaches, 7 national parks, 4 adopted animals, 3 weddings, 2 funerals and 1 child birth were also represented in this year's exhibition.

These images were displayed alongside submissions from those who may not always have an outlet for their creativity and identity, such as: hospital inpatients, migrant communities, and people living in remote areas.

This year as part of the Mosaic People's Choice Award we were able to offer a first, second and third prize with thanks to our supporting partners, Sweet Artist Academy, Captain Cook Cruises and Camera Electronic. Through public voting in the exhibition, first prize went to young photographer Ashley Lowndes with his stunning snap of a running echidna taken in the Pinnacles.



Sketchbook Project

The Sketchbook Project continues to gain popularity, increasing in engagement and registrations with each year. Presented as part of Youth Week WA, the Sketchbook Project celebrates the individuality, self-expression and creativity of young people.

We received over 200 individual registrations, 8 registrations from high school teachers and their classes, and organisation registrations including Headspace Albany, Edmund Rice Centre WA and Mosman Bay Sea Scouts.

In continued partnership with the State Library of WA, hundreds of blank sketchbooks were sent out to 6 regional libraries (Albany, Busselton, Esperance, Katanning, Geraldton and Kalgoorlie) with one extra metro based library in Joondalup.

Completed sketchbooks were returned to the Propel office to be displayed in the State Library of WA from the start of the KickstART Festival until the end of April.

The sketchbooks were then sent on tour to 10 libraries across the state (including Broome, Kalgoorlie, Mandurah, Port Hedland and Mount Barker) from August 2018 to late January 2019, as part of the Travelling Sketchbook Exhibition.

The Sketchbook Project is presented by Propel Youth Arts WA in partnership with State Library of Western Australia as part of the Youth Week WA KickstART Festival, which is proudly supported by the State Government of Western Australia.









Other Projects

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City of Perth Busking Trial

This year Propel was offered the opportunity by City of Perth to run a Busking Program, to trial their new busking guidelines. These guidelines have been developed to support and encourage performers from all backgrounds, abilities, and through different mediums, to showcase their craft in the city. Following a public callout through our social media channels, ...

we recieved over 30 applications for 10 available positions.

Each successful artist was offered a free 12-month busking permit, two paid performance slots through November – December, and complimentary photography and videography of their performance. Our busking artists included emerging puppeteer Rachael Woodward, local music duo Tandem, and 12-year-old guitarist Mitchell Ballardin.



OTHER PROJECTS



Passages Perth

Propel partnered with Passages Perth to commission a young visual artist to paint a large mural in one of the appointment rooms at their new hub facility in Edward Street, Perth. Emerging artist Gabby Loo was offered the opportunity and, across four days, created a calming and refreshing mural work with a combination of spray paints and acrylic house paints.

Gabby hopes that young people can identify with the mural at Passages in their own way:

"Art serves such an important purpose for me and my life as a young person, and being able to get me through times of distress and even happier times through just being a solid foundation in my life that lets me grow."



Scott Guerini

Twelve-year-old Telethon fundraiser Scott Guerini was mentored by Jamie McGleave and auspiced by Propel, to present free workshops for other children in Alkimos in January 2018. Scott first walked 25km to raise funds for the charity when he was four and has continued to walk each year, covering a marathon distance the past four times. He has raised over \$110,000 for Telethon since 2010.

He has also written a book, Did you know you can change the world?, to inspire children to help others. The workshops were based on Scott's book and stem from a partnership between the Alkimos Beach Seedling Fund and Propel. Scott worked with 66 participants aged between 7 and 15 across the five workshops, and all artworks were then displayed in the community.











Youth Comedy Engagement Program

The benefits around confidence building, mental health and social connection that sharing humour provides could be particularly beneficial to young people in WA. With this in mind, Propel established a partnership with The Gelo Company, piloting a comedy engagement program to determine the viability of establishing a long-term independent youth-led comedy initiative or organisation in Perth.

Since August 2018, Rose Kingdom-Barron has worked between both organisations, consulting with young people as well as the broader community on the interest, support, and engagement there may be for this project. The results of this consultation process will be reviewed in April 2019.







NOTE 1: STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

This financial report is a special purpose financial report prepared for use by the directors and memners of Propel Youth Arts WA. The directors have determined that the company is not a reporting entity.

The report has been prepare in accordance with the requirements of the following Australian Accounting Standards:

AASB: 1031 Materiality

AASB: 110 Events after the Balance Sheet Date

No other Australian Accounting Standards or other authoritative pronouncements of the Australian Accounting Standards Board have been applied.

The financial report has been prepared an an accrual basis and is based on historic costs and does not take into account changing money values, or except where specifically stated, current valuations of non-current assets.

The following specific accounting policies, which are consistent with the previous period unless otherwise stated, have been adopted in the preparation of this financial report.

PROPERTY, PLANT AND EQUIPMENT

Property, plant and equipment is initially recorded at the cost of acquisition or fair value less, if applicable, any accumulated depreciation and impairment losses. Plant and equipment that has been contributed at no cost, or for nominal cost, is valued and recognised at the fair value of the asset at the date it is acquired. The plant and equipment is reviewed annually by directors to ensure that the carrying amount is not in excess of the recoverable amount from these assets. The recoverable amount is assessed on the basis of the expected net cash flows that will be received from the utilisation of the assets and the subsequent disposal. The expected net cash flows have been discounted to their present values in estimating recoverable amounts.

Freehold land and buildings are measured at their fair value, based on periodic, but at least triennial, valuations by independent external valuers, less subsequent depreciation for buildings.

Increases in the carrying amount of land and buildings arising on revaluation are credited in equity to a revaluation surplus. Decreases against previous increases of the same asset are charged against fair value reserves in equity. All other decreases are charged to profit or loss.

Any accumulated depreciation at the date of revaluation is offset against the gross carrying amount of the asset and the net amount is restated to the revalued amount of the asset.

TRADE AND OTHER RECEIVABLES

Trade receivables and other receivables, including distributions receivable, are recognised at the nominal transaction value without taking into account the time value of money. If required a provision for doubtful debt has been created.

TRADE AND OTHER PAYABLES

Trade and other payables represent the liabilities for goods and services received by the company that remain unpaid at 31 December 2018. Trade payables are recognised at their transaction price. They are subject to normal credit terms and do not bear interest.

EMPLOYEE BENEFITS

Provision is made for the liability for employee entitlements arising from services rendered by employees to 31 December 2018. Employee benefits have been measured at the amounts expected to be paid when the liability is settled, plus related costs.

CASH AND CASH EQUIVALENTS

Cash and cash equivalents include cash on hand, deposits held on call with banks, other short-term highly liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less, and bank overdrafts.

REVENUE RECOGNITION

Revenue from the sale of goods is recognised upon the delivery of goods to customers.

Revenue from the rendering of services is recognised upon the delivery of the services to customers. Revenue from commissions is recognised upon delivery of services to customers.

Revenue from interest is recognised using the effective interest rate method.

Revenue from dividends is recognised when the entity has a right to receive the dividend.

All revenue is stated net of the amount of goods and services tax (GST).

GOODS AND SERVICES TAX

Transactions are recognised net of GST, except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australian Taxation Office (ATO).

Receivables and payables are stated inclusive of the amount of GST receivable or payable. The net amount of GST recoverable from, or payable to, the ATO is included with other receivables or payables in the balance sheet.

GRANTS

Grant revenue is recognised in the income statement when the entity receives the grant, when it is probable that the entity will receive the economic benefits of the grant and the amount can be reliably measured.

If the grant has conditions attached which must be satisfied before the entity is eligible to receive the grant, the recognition of the revenue will be deferred until those conditions are satisfied.

Where the entity incurs an obligation to deliver economic value back to the grant contributor, the transaction is considered a reciprocal transaction and the revenue is recognised as a liability in the balance sheet until the required service has been completed, otherwise the income is recognised on receipt.

Propel Youth Arts WA receives non-reciprocal contributions of assets from the government and other parties for a nominal or zero value. These assets are recognised at their fair value on the date of acquisition in the balance sheet, with an equivalent amount of income recognised in the income statement.

Donations and bequests are recognised as revenue when received.

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
